11. PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Stephen von Sychowski reported on activities since the July 2023 meeting.

Political Action

Meetings with mayors in Metro Vancouver are continuing this month regarding the HandyDart campaign we have been working on alongside a variety of other organizations such as the Save Our HandyDART coalition.

On September 20th the coalition is hosting the Save Our HandyDART! Virtual Townhall. The townhall will take place from 5pm-6:30pm via Zoom. To register, visit www.bit.ly/hdtownhall The event will be hosted by the Founder of the Live Educate Transform Society, Heather McCain. It will feature a panel presentation, and an opportunity to hear the stories of those who are impacted by the current issues with contracted-out HandyDart service. CART caption and ASL interpretation will be available.

Work is also continuing to reach out to local MLA's, and the Ministry of Education, regarding the Vancouver School Board's moves to dispose of public lands, without appropriate consultation, through sales or long-term leases. We have a meeting coming up with Minister Rachna Singh to discuss the issue.

We also convened a meeting earlier this month to discuss next steps in pushing back on the shameful decision of the City of Vancouver to abandon its living wage policy. The meeting was well attended and had tremendous energy. We will be meeting again in October to plan further.

Labour Education

By the time of our regular meeting, the first two of our fifteen assorted classes and workshops in this fall's Labour Education Program will be complete. These will be Investigations & Interrogations, with Mary Thibodeau of Moore Edgar Lyster LLP, and the new advanced class on the same topic, facilitated by Sara Hanson.

Just Transition Working Group

This summer the Just Transition Working Group held its wrap up event, as it has now successfully launched the Sustainable Workforce Coalition. Hosted by the Vancouver Economic Commission, the new coalition will be staffed by Andrew Williamson, who has experience both in just transition work and in labour. I will serve on the coalition's Steering Committee as a Co-Chair, alongside Andrea Reimer.

The coalition defines its goal of a just transition for Vancouver as follows: "A just transition is a worker-centred approach to minimize the impacts of environmental policies on workers in affected industries and to ensure that new opportunities in the "green economy" will

include those previously excluded from the high-carbon economy. The just transition will help move the Metro Vancouver region towards a more equitable future where everyone has social protection, all jobs are decent, emissions are low or at zero, and communities are thriving and resilient."

Labour Day

This Labour Day we were pleased to co-host a Metro Vancouver Labour Day Celebration with our friends and neighbours at New Westminster & District Labour Council. The day was a big success, with hundreds of people filling Edmonds Park to enjoy rousing speeches, live music, union and community booths, free food and refreshments, and exciting activities in the kid's zone.

I'd like to thank everyone who made the day great; our event sponsors, volunteers, entertainers and suppliers, and everyone who hosted a booth.

13. CANADIAN LABOUR CONGRESS REPORT:

Amandeep Nijjar, CLC Representative, presented the CLC report since the July 2023 regular meeting.

My apologies for not making it out today as I'm sick with Covid.

A couple of things to note, Harrison Winter School registration will be open the first week of October. The course calendar should be ready by the end of the month. Single accommodation for Harrison is \$2,200 per student. Harrison will be January 14 to February 16, 2024.

A couple of lobby dates to keep in mind: October 2 & 3 is an Indigenous lobby on the Hill. November 28 is also lobby day on the Hill. Issues to be lobbied are Pharmacare, Sustainable jobs, and Anti-Scab.

We will be having a field lobby sometime in October around those issues and of course it would be great if we can get volunteers to make it happen. We can also offer lobby training.

The campaign for Sustainable jobs will be launched next week by the CLC.

A big thank you for making Labour Day a success. It was a very well attended event and I believe folks appreciated the joint event with the New Westminster and District Labour Council.

We are seeing various marches and protests across the province. We are encouraging folks to stand up by writing to your MLA or to your elected official.

15. EXECUTIVE RECOMMENDATIONS:

a) *M/S/C* that the following recommendation be adopted:

Subject: Spending Authorizations

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL authorize the following expenditures:

- Contribution in the amount of \$200 to the North Okanagan Labour Council for its RISE Memorial, a proposed commemorative garden space in downtown Kelowna in remembrance of the five young men (Cailen Vilness, Jared Zook, Brad Zawislak, Eric Stemmer, and Patrick Stemmer) who tragically lost their lives in a horrific crane collapse at Brooklyn Towers in Kelowna, BC on July 12, 2021.
- 1/8 page ad in souvenir program of International Campaign for Human Rights in the Philippines conference, at a cost of \$100.
- o Renewal of membership in the BC Health Coalition at a cost of \$75.
- b) M/S/C that the following recommendation be adopted:

Subject: Corporate Taxes

BECAUSE corporate tax cuts harm workers, especially low- and middle-income workers, by reducing revenue to programs and services in favour of higher corporate profits; and

BECAUSE the trend towards lower corporate taxes is a feature of the neoliberal agenda, alongside deregulations and privatization; and

BECAUSE real wages have stagnated, while CEO salaries are today 243 times those of the average worker in Canada,

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL oppose corporate tax cuts, and support progressive taxation policies at all levels, including increasing corporate taxes to appropriate levels.

c) *M/S/C* that the following recommendation be adopted:

Subject: Privatization

BECAUSE the Vancouver & District Labour Council has a proud history of opposing privatization, contracting out, and P3's as harmful to working people and the programs and services we all rely upon; and

BECAUSE public enterprises such as ICBC or BC Hydro here in British Columbia, and others across the globe, demonstrate the ability of public ownership to provide superior outcomes, improve universality of access, and generate revenue and benefits for people, rather than profits for private enterprise,

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL reiterate its support for the expansion of public ownership and operation, and its opposition to privatization, including P3's and contracting out of public services; and

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL FURTHER call upon the provincial government to repatriate contracted out services, as has been done in health care, wherever they are found.

d) *M/S/C* that the following recommendation be adopted:

Subject: Maximum Indoor Temperature Bylaw

BECAUSE extreme heat and hotter, dryer summers have become commonplace in recent years; and

BECAUSE these extreme temperatures have caused numerous medical emergencies, and several deaths, as was seen during the 2021 heat dome; and

BECAUSE there are presently no maximum temperatures established in regulation for rental dwellings; and

BECAUSE Vancouver City Councillor Christine Boyle (OneCity) brought forward a motion in 2022 for a staff report on options for implementing a maximum indoor temperature bylaw, and this motion was adopted by council,

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL endorse the policy of establishing maximum indoor temperatures for rental dwellings and support it however practicable.

e) *M/S/C* that the following recommendation be adopted:

Subject: BC New Democratic Party Convention

BECAUSE our labour council, as part of the Canadian Labour Congress, is affiliated to the BC New Democratic Party and, as a result, is entitled to send one (1) delegate to its upcoming convention,

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL designate President Stephen von Sychowski as its delegate to the November 17-19 BC New Democratic Party convention.

f) *M/S/C* that the following recommendation be adopted:

<u>Subject:</u> <u>Labour's Participation with Municipal Political Parties in the City of Vancouver</u>

by OneCity, and its elected representatives, in providing a consistent progressive counterpoint to the ABC majorities on Vancouver City Council, School Board, and Park Board; and

BECAUSE the VDLC has enjoyed a positive relationship with OneCity, endorsing all its candidates since the party's formation; and

BECAUSE OneCity pulled well above its anticipated weight in the 2022 municipal election, spending more than any left-of-centre party (except for Mayor Stewart's slate) and over twice that of the next largest spender, while engaging a strong base of volunteers, re-electing its incumbents, and bringing most of its other candidates near the finish line; and

BECAUSE OneCity is a party with roots in the labour movement, which has actively sought to build a strong relationship with our labour council, listen to the concerns of workers, and to represent the interests of working people in the city; and

BECAUSE the Labour Council also acknowledges and deeply values its relationship with labour endorsed representatives from the Coalition of Progressive Electors and the Green Party of Vancouver and recognizes their good work during this term of office to-date,

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL continue to support and work with labour endorsed elected representatives, and their parties, in the City of Vancouver; and

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL work to encourage progressive unity in Vancouver municipal politics; and

THE VANCOUVER AND DISTRICT LABOUR COUNCIL WILL encourage its delegates and affiliates to support, join, and take an active part in OneCity.

Busy Summer. Members servicing high workload issues contributing to low number of stewards. We held very successful BBQ's with 1/3 of membership attending at our Point Grey campus contributing to member's interest in stewarding and membership engagement. We're building a ladder of engagement by empowering members through BIPOC caucus to be able to point to relevant parts of their C/A. We also held a Social Justice Training workshop with labour lawyer Adrienne Smith which has helped to ID good stewards. Our network is being built. If anyone has tips or stories of success, please share. Grievance on flex time being used to mitigate overtime for precarious workers on night shifts. Meal breaks are interrupted and no meal penalties. Layoffs are being seen due to lack of funding for certain programs and competition is fierce for internal candidates requiring constant follow-ups to ensure members are supported in recall.

<u>Eric Proulx – BCTF | VEAES</u>

School Liaison officer program has returned despite ample evidence from Black, Indigenous, POC and +LGBTQ students that feel unsafe and are 21% of incarcerated students which only makes up 6% of the school population. <u>Jeannete McConnell – CUPW Local 846</u>

Our collective agreement expires January 31, 2024. We have assigned our National Negotiating Committee. Canada Post has stated that they will be rolling out the horrible SSD - Single Sort and Delivery throughout the country. Vancouver Local has 1 station - North Fraser – that is SSD. It means local carrier's become sorters, and some remain as letter carriers. Basically, a letter carrier comes in and grabs their mail, flyers and parcels and leaves to deliver. These result in very long routes. Average steps per day are 24,000 to 30,000. We will strike to resist this move. At Christmas time, North Fraser needs help to cover routes that haven't been covered in a week or more. Transfer lists to this depot tend to remain open as no one wants to work at these depots. Casuals that start at these depots struggle when they go to non-SSD depots because they do not know how to sort and pull mail. Casuals that are sent to SSD hate it as the routes are long and suffer from emotional, mental and physical stress. We have been trying to organize our work floors through a program that began in Edmonton and with our former President Roland Schmidt and former National Internal Organizer, Dave Bleakney. We are trying to build worker power – trying to engage workers where they work. The corporation is sending our employee surveys and having pizza days. There has been a huge cut in dayshift positions throughout the country. Part-time positions have been relegated to the middle of the night from 2am to 7am in the morning. This attached families and flexibility for single-parent families.
